"We come from the same background, both born in Israel, both children of Holocaust survivor parents," says Craven. "We even learned we lived on the same street. Not at the same time – but on the same street, in Toronto."

For Reva and Rose the shared experience is invaluable. "She has a granddaughter who is the same age as my granddaughter," she says. "We're just on the samewavelength for so many things. Sometimes people call us 'R-Squared' and mistake us for sisters! We're together a lot, I'm a part of their family and they're a part of mine," says Craven.

Much like Reva, Rose sees her volunteerism as a joy, not an obligation. "I get more out of volunteering than I give, and I've met so many fabulous people.

She has opened her heart to the children since Day 1 and is a big part of our Intergeneration program between Active Older Adults and the child care centre.



Fostered community affiliation of nearly 500 youth through **BBYO**, **BBYO Connect** and other teen programs.



Brenda St. Clair is this year's recipient of the Fitness department's Ken H. Kronson Kehilla award for volunteerism.


Brenda is an integral member of the Fitness Walking group that meets three times a week.

St. Clair adds.


KEHILLA KORNER – LORI GILFIX (SPORTS DINNER)

Report of the Independent Auditors on the Summarized Financial Statements

To the Directors of

The Y.M.H.A. Jewish Community Centre of Winnipeg, Inc.

The accompanying summarized financial statements, which comprise the statement of financial position as at August 31, 2015 and the statement of operations for the year then ended, are derived from the audited financial statements of The Y.M.H.A. Jewish Community Centre of Winnipeg, Inc. for the year ended August 31, 2015. We expressed a qualified audit opinion on those financial statements in our report dated November 30, 2015 (see below).

The summarized financial statements do not contain all the disclosures required by Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations. Reading the summarized financial statements, therefore, is not a substitute for reading the audited financial statements of the organization.

Management's Responsibility for the Summarized Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation of a summary of the audited financial statements on the following basis:

The summarized financial statements include the major totals and subtotals from the related complete financial statements dealing with matters having a pervasive or otherwise significant effect on the summarized financial statements.

Auditors' Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on the summarized financial statements based on our procedures, which were conducted in accordance with Canadian Auditing Standard (CAS) 810, "Engagements to Report on Summary of Financial Statements".

Opinion

In our opinion, the summarized financial statements derived from the audited financial statements of The Y.M.H.A. Jewish Community Centre of Winnipeg, Inc. for the year ended August 31, 2015 are a fair summary of those statements, on the basis described above. However, the summarized financial statements are misstated to the equivalent extent as the audited financial statements of The Y.M.H.A. Jewish Community Centre of Winnipeg, Inc. for the year ended August 31, 2015.

The possible misstatement of the audited financial statements is described in our qualified audit opinion in our report dated November 30, 2015. Our qualified audit opinion is based on the fact that the Organization derives part of its revenue from the general public in the form of contributions and fundraising which are not susceptible of satisfactory audit verification. Accordingly, our verification of these revenues was limited to the amounts recorded in the records of the Organization and we were not able to determine whether any adjustments might be necessary to contributions and fundraising, excess of revenues over expenses, current assets and changes in fund balances. Our qualified audit opinion states that, except for the possible effects of the described matter, these financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of The Y.M.H.A. Jewish Community Centre of Winnipeg, Inc. as at August 31, 2015, and the results of its operations and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations.




